Museum looking for you to volunteer

Over the past two years, The St. Vital Museum has undergone a dramatic increase in visitors and artifacts which has placed an everincreasing workload on a small core of volunteers

New acquisitions are catalogued by volunteers while tackling the daunting task of giving past donations a number before entering the information into the system. The museum officially opened in May 2008 in the area of the St. Vital Fire Hall that was once home to the St. Vital Police and Magistrates Court. Two years ago, the floor space was expanded to take in the entire main floor ad basement of the 104-year old building at 600 St. Mary's Rd.

The opening marked the beginning of the Museum from the St. Vital Historical Society which stored many artifacts etc. in labelled acid-free boxes. The artifacts need to be numbered and entered into a program called File Maker Pro which is installed into computers used by volunteers.

Volunteers will be trained by Co-Ordinator Emma Barkman.

The majority of artifacts need proper descriptions entered into the data base, said Barkman.

"This requires walking through the museum writing detailed descriptions" said Barkman. "There are binders, books and videos that need to be matched to files in the data base as well as a number of newspaper clippings and photos that need to be scanned. Many of the books have not been moved in quite some time and need to be matched to the proper files."
The agricultural display needs volunteers familiar with vintage farm tools, and tools in general, to catalogue the items.

The museum is also in need of people willing to dust and clean artifacts and is also willing to vacuum etc.
